A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

FROM

LOS ANGELES'S PULSE

For more than a century artists working as writers, visual artists, filmmakers, actors, and musicians have defined Los Angeles's history and formed the city's heart and soul. Every two years the Hammer mounts an invitational exhibition that focuses on work created in L.A. These shows present opportunities for all of us to explore the vast wealth of artistic expression this city has to offer. This spring we open the next installment of this series—*Nine Lives: Visionary Artists from L.A.*, curated by Ali Subotnick. Like those that have come before—*Eden's Edge, Thing, International Paper*, and *Snapshot*—*Nine Lives* brings a unique perspective on artists that may be familiar, and a surprising look at new talent.

Across the country arts organizations large and small are having a difficult time. At the Hammer, we too are tightening our belt and battening down the hatches to ride out this storm. In spite of these challenges or perhaps because of them, there seems to be a collective acknowledgement across Los Angeles of how important the arts are to us and to the health and vibrancy of our city. It is very apparent that our continued stewardship and support of art and culture is crucial and that we must be vigilant in our care. We are lucky to have such a great diversity of museums, cultural centers, and theaters at our disposal, and it is the responsibility of us all to safeguard them.

As we move forward, one very resourceful approach that many local organizations, including the Hammer, are taking is collaboration. Together, we can do more than we can alone and sharing resources, both creative and financial, will only make the offerings richer. Recently the Hammer announced that it will participate in two major citywide cultural collaborations. Opening in 2010, the Ring Festival LA is a celebration, led by the LA Opera, of Wagner's *Ring Cycle*, showcasing a variety of exhibitions, symposia, conferences, performances, and programs hosted by many of L.A.'s most important cultural institutions. The Hammer will present a series of corresponding public programs exploring historical and technical aspects of Wagner's work.

We are also particularly pleased to announce that the Hammer has joined the Getty, MOCA, and LACMA as the lead organizations for *Pacific Standard Time: Art in L.A. 1945–1980*, an unprecedented series of concurrent exhibitions in 2011 at museums throughout Southern California. The Hammer's contribution to this project is the exhibition *Now Dig This! Art and Black Los Angeles 1960–1980* curated by Kellie Jones; it promises to be among the most comprehensive explorations of the subject to date.

This is an important moment for us all to remember that artists are the pulse of this community and the country, and I urge you to **support your local arts institutions**! They need you now more than ever and, as the late John Updike said, "What art offers is space—a certain breathing room for the spirit."

Nine Lives: Visionary Artists from L.A. is the fifth in the Hammer's biannual invitational exhibition series highlighting work created in greater Los Angeles. *Nine Lives* features over 125 works, many of them new, by nine artists spanning four generations—Lisa Anne Auerbach, **Julie Becker, Llyn Foulkes, Charles Irvin, Hirsch Perlman, Victoria Reynolds, Kaari Upson, Jeffrey Vallance**, and **Charlie White**. The works include video, paintings, drawings, photography, textiles, and two new sculptural installations. As all the artists live and work in L.A., *Nine Lives* embodies many of the psychic complexities and paradoxes of the city—it is at once beautiful and frightening, refined and unruly. The reinvention of oneself is central to several of these artists' practices. They create characters and tell stories of fantasy and science fiction, building alternative worlds grounded in their obsessions. Popular culture and mythology are common themes, as are unconventional lifestyles and subcultures. The luxury of space and privacy that Los Angeles affords allows them the freedom to tinker, research, and explore their obsessions, which often parallel those of Hollywood's dream factory. The exhibition is curated by Ali Subotnick, and it is her first large-scale project since she joined the curatorial team at the Hammer in 2006.



April 21 – May 17, 2009

It Is What It Is: Conversations About Iraq is a new work by British artist Jeremy Deller. The artist has invited a revolving group of participants—including Iraq war veterans, journalists, scholars, and Iraqi nationals—to take up residence at the Hammer Museum. Objects meant to stimulate discussion, including a car that was destroyed in Iraq, will share the gallery with the resident guest experts. In March, Deller will travel aboard an RV with two Iraq experts and a writer, who will document the journey. The RV will stop at various cultural institutions along the way to continue the conversation on a national scale, arriving at the Hammer Museum in April. It Is What It Is: Conversations About Iraq is curated at the New Museum by Laura Hoptman, Kraus Family Senior Curator and Amy Mackie, Curatorial Assistant and for Creative Time by Nato Thompson, Curator.

Project curators, the artist, and individuals with firsthand experience in Iraq discuss the exhibition *It Is What It Is: Conversations About Iraq*, and their cross-country road trip. Artist **Jeremy Deller** creates a broad range of projects, including orchestrated events, films, and publications that draw attention to forms of culture on the fringes of the mainstream. **Jonathan Harvey** spent a year long tour in Iraq in 2007, in charge of a detachment of soldiers in northwest Baghdad. **Laura Hoptman** and **Amy Mackie** of the New Museum are co-curators of this exhibition. **Esam Pasha** is a painter and writer from Iraq who was the first artist to paint a new mural over a portrait of Saddam Hussein. **Nato Thompson** is Chief Curator at Creative Time in New York City.

URBAN CHINA: INFORMAL CITIES

April 25 – July 19, 2009

Urban China: Informal Cities is the first U.S. exhibition of *Urban China*, the only magazine published in China devoted to issues of urbanism. The magazine's global, cross-disciplinary network of correspondents and collaborators merge rigorous methods of data collection and analysis of rapidly developing cities in China with witty graphic representations of their findings. This installation will include a built environment of reclaimed construction materials; a massive wall graphic combining photographs, found images, numerical data, and maps; a Flash-based, user-navigable database of photographs; and a selected collection of past issues of *Urban China*. This exhibition is curated by Benjamin Godsill, Curatorial Associate, New Museum.

Conversations on Urban China with Sylvia Lavin Director of Critical Studies and MA/PhD programs in UCLA's Department of Architecture and Urban Design, **Sylvia Lavin** engages artists, architects, and curators in a series of lively discussions on how cities are increasingly molded by images rather than buildings; on whether art and architecture are converging to form an integrated type of cultural consumption; and if the concept of the masterpiece has finally been destroyed by the sheer quantity of global design production.

Tuesday, April 28, 7pm Jeffrey Kipnis & Thom Mayne

Jeffrey Kipnis is professor of architectural design and theory at the Knowlton School of Architecture at Ohio State University and architecture/design curator for the Wexner Center for the Arts. Thom Mayne, Professor, UCLA Department of Architecture and Urban Design, is principal of Morphosis, founded as an interdisciplinary and collective practice involved in experimental design and research.

Wednesday, April 29, 7pm Doug Aitken & Catherine Opie

Widely known for innovative installations such as *Sleepwalkers*, presented at the Museum of Modern Art, New York, in 2007, **Doug Aitken** utilizes a wide array of media and artistic

approaches, leading us into a world where time, space, and memory are fluid concepts. **Catherine Opie** is engaged in issues of documentary photography and in how aspects of identity and collective behaviors are shaped by architecture. A Professor of Photography at UCLA, Opie was featured in a solo exhibition at the Guggenheim Museum in New York in 2008.

Tuesday, May 19, 7pm

Hou Hanru & Qingyun Ma

An art critic and international curator, **Hou Hanru** is also the director of exhibitions and public programs at the San Francisco Art Institute. Recent curatorial projects include the 10th Istanbul Biennial and Trans(ient) City, 2007. **Qingyun Ma** is principal of the Shanghai-based design firm s.p.a.m., established in 1996. Since 2007 Ma has also served as dean of the USC School of Architecture, where he has enhanced the program by developing a number of global initiatives.

A leading figure in current debates, **Sylvia Lavin** is known for her scholarship in contemporary architecture and design. She has published in leading journals of the field, and her book *Form Follows Libido: Architecture and Richard Neutra in a Psychoanalytic Culture* was published in 2005.

Erin Cosgrove

Through March 15, 2009

Erin Cosgrove's epic animation *What Manner of Person Art Thou?* (2008) follows brothers Yoder and Troyer, the only survivors of two small agrarian colonies in the northwestern U.S., after a series of catastrophes and epidemics. The two set off on a journey to find any remaining relatives and begin dispensing violent justice on the evildoers of contemporary society; each encounter represents one of the seven deadly sins. The striking visuals are inspired by the 11th-century Bayeux Tapestry. The video is a darkly funny tale of the corruption of modern life and the hazards of morality. Cosgrove lives and works in Los Angeles, and this is her first solo museum exhibition.

Christopher Russell

Through April 12, 2009

Los Angeles-based artist Christopher Russell uses *Budget Decadence*, his recently completed novella, as the basis for this installation. Russell creates an all-encompassing environment that employs text, photography, and handmade books. For his debut solo museum exhibition, he invites viewers into a world where the ideas and implications of family and home take an apocalyptic turn. Wallpaper based on a William Morris design contains the text from the first chapter of his novella. A series of photographs, some of which have been hand altered, are conceptually linked to the story. Four artist's books, intended to be handled and read by visitors, contain subsequent chapters of the novella and focus on the deepest inner workings of four related characters.

Shirana Shahbazi

Through may 7, 2009

Zurich-based artist Shirana Shahbazi's photographs capture the quotidian moments of life, whether it's a close-up of a gem, a still life, a fallen bird, or a portrait of a young girl. She often transforms her photos by hiring commercial sign painters to reinterpret the imagery or by commissioning carpet-makers in her native Tehran to weave the pictures into small carpets. During her stay in Los Angeles as a Hammer artist-in-residence, Shahbazi explored the city and developed a new body of work that captures Los Angeles and its surroundings. Her project for the Lobby Wall incorporates several of these new photographs as well as a wall-size painting made by Iranian sign painters after one of her photographs. *Hammer Projects: Shirana Shahbazi* is presented through a residency at the Hammer Museum. The Hammer Museum's Artist Residency Program was initiated with funding from the Nimoy Foundation and is supported through a significant grant from the James Irvine Foundation.

Wang Qingsong

March 24 – June 14, 2009

Wang Qingsong is a contemporary Chinese artist known for his large-scale photographs that explore the political, social, and cultural issues of a rapidly changing China. The Hammer is pleased to present Wang's newest work and his first video, entitled *Skyscraper* (2008). Over the course of a month, employing 30 scaffolding workers from the poor countryside outside of Beijing, Wang built a 35m high "skyscraper." Using stop-action 35mm film, he captures the entire process but without the workers visible.

Nic Hess

May 23 – November 5, 2009

Swiss artist Nic Hess is known for his inventive wall works composed almost entirely of masking tape. Like a master graffiti artist, he turns everyday imagery into bold graphics, often borrowing logos from corporations. Combining his own drawings, bright colors, and icons from a variety of sources, Hess makes us reevaluate our understanding of familiar signs in consumer culture. In his elaborate compositions he draws new connections and weaves a loose narrative of worlds colliding and visions exploding. For the Hammer's Lobby Wall, Hess will present a new work specially designed for the site.

THE DARKER SIDE OF LIGHT ARTS OF PRIVACY, 1850-1900

April 5 – June 28, 2009 The exhibition is Organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington.

For much of today's public, the art of the late 19th-century means impressionism, an art of the open air and the café-concert, evoking the pleasure of the landscape and the city with its many entertainments. There is another side to the story, a discreet world of individual collecting in which prints, drawings, and small sculpture were kept aside in portfolios or stored away in cabinets. Here the experience of art was a private affair, where prints in particular were valued for their aesthetic spontaneity, probing social observation, and intimate psychological suggestion. The exhibition includes small cabinet piece sculptures, illustrated books, and portfolios in addition to prints, and is accompanied by a catalog with four illustrated essays.

AOUSEGUEST FRANCESCA GABBIANI SELECTS FROM UCLA COLLECTIONS

through May 24, 2009

The Hammer Museum presents the second exhibition in Housequest, a new series in which artists are invited to curate a show from among the university's diverse collections. For this exhibition, Los Angeles-based artist Francesa Gabbiani explores the subjects of witchcraft and sorcery. She browsed through the collections of the Grunwald Center for the Graphic Arts at the Hammer, and UCLA's Departments of Special Collections at both the Charles E. Young Research Library and the Louise M. Darling Biomedical Library. Gabbiani pursued her research with an eye for mysterious and macabre images, illustrations of poisonous and deadly plants, as well as representations of unearthly figures like saints and fairies. The eclectic selection of prints and illustrated books range in date from the Renaissance to the present. In this installation, Gabbiani proposes an intriguing exploration of mystical powers and magical spells.

The Hammer presents the first full-scale survey exhibition in the U.S. of the work of Larry Johnson. Johnson, born in 1959, is one of many important figures who emerged from CalArts in the 1980s. His unique style blends drawing, painting, photography, graphic design, and text. Many works explore themes of Hollywood and celebrity, where aspirations and fantasies bump up against reality. Texts are a crucial part of Johnson's work, either written by him or appropriated from disparate sources such as *People* magazine, pulp fiction, celebrity autobiographies, black box flight recorders, and rock lyrics. This exhibition is curated by Russell Ferguson, Chair of the Department of Art, UCLA.

SECOND NATURE

THE VALENTINE-ADELSON COLLECTION AT THE HAMMER July 19 – October 4, 2009

Since the early to mid-1990s, sculpture has proven to be a particularly intense and inventive area of artistic practice in Los Angeles. This will be the first public presentation of the extraordinary gift by Dean Valentine and Amy Adelson to the Hammer of more than 50 sculptures by 29 Los Angeles artists, made from 1995 to the present. This collection includes many of the key works by this new generation of artists and captures a significant moment in L.A. art-making that stands out for the abundance of handmade sculpture and the return of the consideration of the tangible object.

Debi Barker is the international director for the Center for Food Safety (CFS), a legal and public policy institute in Washington D.C. She was formerly the co-director of the International Forum on Globalization (IFG), a think tank that analyses and critiques forms of economic globalization. She recently authored The Predictable Rise and Fall of Global *Industrial Agriculture*, which highlights international policies causing ecological and social harm, and provides alternative strategies to the current food system. Peter Sellars is one of the leading theater, opera, and television directors in the world, having directed more than 100 productions across America and abroad. He was Artistic Director of the 1990 and 1993 Los Angeles Festivals, and he is currently a Professor of World Arts and Cultures at UCLA. He has specialized in 20th-century operas and is a recipient of the MacArthur Fellowship.

LI EDELKOORT & MURRAY MOSS thursday, MAY 21, 7PM

Li Edelkoort studied fashion and design at the School of Fine Arts in Arnhem, where she soon discovered her talent for sensing upcoming trends. In 2003 *Time* Magazine named her one of the world's 25 Most Influential People in Fashion. Her recent work includes teaching at the Design Academy Eindhoven, conducting humanitarian outreach with the Heartwear foundation, and curating multiple design exhibitions around the world. In 1994 former fashion entrepreneur Murray Moss opened Moss in a former gallery space in SoHo, with a determination to transform the public perception of industrial product design. The New York Times called Moss "arguably the best design store in America" (2003), and the store quickly became internationally known for its product selection and presentation, with clients ranging from highly informed design professionals to celebrities and students.

ASIAN AMERICAN ARTISTS IN CALIFORNIA – A SYMPOSIUM

Saturday, March 14, 9am – 1pm From the Chinese photographers of the gold rush to contemporary video artists, men and women of Asian descent have produced a rich, diverse body of artwork. Examining the lives and work of artists past and present offers insights into issues of cultural hybridity, race, social climate, and transnationalism. 

A NEW NEW DEAL James Galbraith Tuesday, April 21, 7pm

With banks failing, credit frozen, homes foreclosing, and unemployment rising at a rate not experienced since the Great Depression, how does President Obama stimulate the economy back to life? One of Obama's economic advisers, Dr. **James Galbraith**, will join us to outline a "New New Deal" to save our economy. Galbraith teaches economics at the LBJ School at the University of Texas, Austin, where he is also the Director of The Inequality Project. Galbraith serves as Chair of the Board of Economists for Peace and Security. He writes a column called "Econoclast" for *Mother Jones* and occasional commentary in many other publications, including *The Texas Observer, The American Prospect*, and *The Nation*. RESTORING CHECKS AND BALANCES AND THE RULE OF LAW Bruce Fein & Philippe Sands Thursday, May 7, 7pm

Two distinguished legal scholars, offering different viewpoints, join us to discuss how Obama might relinquish the unprecedented "unitary executive" powers that the Bush/Cheney administration have claimed. **Bruce Fein** is a constitutional lawyer who served as associate deputy attorney general under the Reagan administration, general counsel of the Federal Communications Commission, and research director for the Joint Congressional Committee on Covert Arms Sales to Iran. He is the author of *Constitutional* Peril: The Life and Death Struggle for Our Constitution and Democracy. **Philippe Sands** is an international lawyer and a professor of law at University College, London. He has been involved in many leading international cases, including those involving the treatment of British detainees at Guantanamo Bay. His new book is The Torture Team: Rumsfeld's Memo and the Betrayal of American Values.

AFGHANISTAN: OBAMA'S VIETNAM? Chris Fair & Nake Kamrany Tuesday, May 26, 7pm

As President Obama implements his new strategy in the war in Afghanistan, we will examine the chances of success of applying more resources to rescue a failed state. **Chris Fair**, a senior political scientist at the RAND Corporation, an expert on U.S. relations with India and Pakistan who spent much of 2008 in Afghanistan working for the United Nations, will sit down with Dr. **Nake Kamrany**. Kamrany is Professor of Economics and Director of the Program in Law and Economics at the University of Southern California. From Afghanistan, Dr. Kamrany has known and studied the various political movements and players who have participated in the de-evolution of this war-ravaged country since the Soviet occupation.

REVERSING THE DETERIORATION OF U.S./RUSSIAN RELATIONS Richard Anderson & Nina Krushcheva thursday, March 5, 7pm

Richard Anderson, professor of political science, is an expert on Russian and Soviet politics and foreign policy. His research focuses on the transition from Soviet dictatorship to Russian democracy and on political discourse in democratic and undemocratic polities. He is the co-author of *Post-Communism and the Theory of Democracy*, which deals with post-Soviet politics. The granddaughter of a Soviet leader discusses the cold peace that has frozen the promise of warmer relations between the former cold war adversaries. **Nina L. Khrushcheva** is an Associate Professor in the Graduate Program of International Affairs at The New School and senior fellow of the World Policy Institute. She is the author of *Imagining Nabokov: Russia between Art and Politics* (2007) and is currently working on a new book project, *Russia's Gulag of the Mind*.




