NEW CURATORIAL STAFF MEMBER

In March the Hammer welcomed Allison Agsten as curator of public engagement and director of visitor services. In her newly created role, she collaborates with the artist-in-residence and with staff to reenvision the museum experience. Formerly, Agsten was director of communications at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, where she launched a number of key initiatives aimed at connecting the museum and the community. Prior to that, she was a producer in CNN's Los Angeles bureau, where she regularly covered the arts.

A MESSAGE FROM THE D

Last month the Hammer had the great honor of hosting a day-long series of panel discussions and meetings with United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon for the Global Creative Forum. The gathering was an opportunity for Secretary-General Ban to meet with key Hollywood professionals to encourage film and television story lines about some of the U.N.'s most significant concerns, with a particular focus on the rights of woman globally and violence against women. Participants included Dr. Margaret Chan (Executive Director of the World Health Organization), Dr. Helene Gayle (CEO of CARE), Blake Mycoskie (founder of Tom's Shoes), and actors Michael Douglas, Julia Ormond, and Anne Hathaway. The day was incredibly inspiring and included leading figures in human rights that make contributions to social justice, a cleaner environment, and world peace. The Hammer welcomed this opportunity to be a global as well as a local town hall.

The Hammer Student Association (HSA) is wrapping up its first year of work with the Museum. Made up of UCLA students, the HSA focuses on increased student involvement and develops student-oriented programs based on artists and exhibitions featured at the Hammer. The HSA recently presented the second annual *Bike Night* at the Museum. Over 1,500 people flocked to the Hammer on their bicycles for free music, film, vegan food, and a special appearance by Paul Reubens who introduced his film, Pee Wee's Big Adventure. This June, the group is also publishing the first issue of its interdisciplinary journal about the arts, GRAPHITE, featuring student writing,

artwork, and interviews. The HSA is a tremendous asset to the Museum and has done a remarkable job in this inaugural year—we are very excited to see what they come up with next year.

This summer we are partnering with 89.9 KCRW on our Also I Like to Rock concert series. As many of you know, each summer the Hammer's courtyard hosts some of the hottest names in Indie Rock for free concerts. This year is no different as we present a terrific lineup of bands and a great roster of KCRW's DJs who will be spinning before each performance. (See page 12 for lineup and details.) By collaborating with organizations such as the Global Creative Forum, the Hammer Student Association, and KCRW the Hammer continues to be a hub of extraordinary activity and we hope you join us this summer!
















This summer the Hammer Museum will host a major exhibition marking the joint acquisition of the complete archive of prints by Los Angeles publisher Edition Jacob Samuel by the UCLA Grunwald Center for the Graphic Arts, Hammer Museum, and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Since 1988 Jacob Samuel has published 43 portfolios of prints made by a diverse group of international artists, including Marina Abramović, John Baldessari, Chris Burden, Mona Hatoum, Rebecca Horn, Anish Kapoor, Barry McGee, Ed Moses, Matthew Monahan, Wangechi Mutu, Gabriel Orozco, Nancy Rubins, Ed Ruscha, Robert Therrien, James Welling, Christopher Wool, and Andrea Zittel, among many others. Working primarily in series in intaglio mediums such as etching, drypoint, and aquatint, Samuel has invited artists to create prints in his Santa Monica studio but has also traveled internationally to collaborate with artists in their own studios. The number of prints included in each portfolio range from 6 to 36, with more than 550 individual prints included in the 43 portfolios. The exhibition will be situated in the museum's main temporary exhibition galleries and will include all the published portfolios as well as related proofs and other preparatory works. The exhibition is organized by the Hammer Museum and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and is curated by Cynthia Burlingham, director of the Grunwald Center for the Graphic Arts and deputy director of collections at the Hammer Museum, with Britt Salvesen, department head and curator of the Wallis Annenberg department of photography and department head and curator of prints and drawings, and Leslie Jones, associate curator of prints and drawings, at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

OF C. G. JUNG CREATION OF A NEW COSMOLOGY

THE RED BOOK

The Hammer Museum presents an exhibition of preeminent psychologist Carl Jung's (1875–1961) famous Red Book, thought to be the most influential unpublished work in the history of psychology by many contemporary scholars. Jung also considered the *Red Book* to be his most important work or, as he said, the "prima materia for a lifetime's work." Until recently, however, the book has spent most of the last 50 years locked away in a Swiss safe deposit box, and very few people have actually seen it. Together with the 95-year-old volume, which Jung worked on from 1914 to 1930, the Hammer Museum is exhibiting a number of oil, chalk, and tempera paintings and preparatory sketches related to the *Red Book*, as well as other original manuscripts, including the Black Books, which contain ideas and fantasies culminating in the Red Book. The Hammer is the only West Coast venue for the exhibition, and the presentation also includes an important series of public programs to further explore the work and legacy of C. G. Jung. This exhibition is curated by Dr. Martin Brauen and Dr. Sonu Shamdasani.

This exhibition was organized by the Rubin Museum of Art, New York, in collaboration with the Foundation of the Works of C. G. Jung. 
LUISA LAMBRI BFING THERE

Over the course of a year, Luisa Lambri made several visits to Southern California to photograph the iconic homes designed by renowned architect John Lautner. Inspired by Lautner's desire to connect his buildings to their natural surroundings, Lambri trained her lens on his windows. Friedrich Kunath

Continues through OCTOBER 14, 2010

Like a favorite poem, Friedrich Kunath's works poignantly yet playfully distill the fundamentals of human emotion—desire, loneliness, and anxiety—creating comically tragic scenes in which human beings try to find their way in the world. Employing an impressive range of mediums—drawing, painting, sculpture, installation, and a neon sign—Kunath has covered the lobby walls with men's suit fabrics, creating a salon setting both fantastical and quotidian revolving around a number of middle-aged male characters struggling to define their lives in a sea of uncertainty. Diana Al-Hadid

May 15 – August 15, 2010

Sculptor Diana Al-Hadid constructs baroque architectural forms such as towers, labyrinths, and pipe organs that appear to be in a state of ruin. Composed from steel, polystyrene, cardboard, plywood, plaster, and resin, Al-Hadid's sculptures are informed by an array of influences, both Eastern and Western—ancient biblical and mythological narratives, Arabic oral traditions,

Gothic architecture, iconic Western painting, Islamic ornamentation, and scientific advances in physics and astronomy. For her first solo museum exhibition, Al-Hadid made a new piece inspired by the Islamic astronomer and inventor Al-Jazari's famous water clock, built in 1206, and early Netherlandish Renaissance paintings. Organized by Anne Ellegood, Hammer senior curator.

Greg Lynn

May 21 – September 26, 2010

This summer, the Hammer Museum will present a new sculptural work by Los Angeles-based architect Greg Lynn. A fantastical attraction for visitors of all ages, *Fountain of Toys* will be located in the museum's outdoor courtyard. The work is a functioning fountain made entirely out of found large plastic children's toys that have been cut and reassembled in multiple layers, with water spouting from its top and pooling at its base. Constructed from more

than seventy-five prefabricated plastic whale and shark teeter-totters welded together and unified by the application of white automotive paint, *Fountain of Toys* will be a gathering place during the warm summer months.

Greg Lynn's Fountain of Toys is the first in a new series of projects focused on architecture and design. Taking place approximately once a year over the next three years, these projects will focus on the presentation of new works by architects and designers and will be placed in different locations around the museum. Organized by Sylvia Lavin, Director of Critical Studies and MA/PhD Programs UCLArchitecture.

Stephen G. Rhodes

June 19 – September 26, 2010

Los Angeles-based artist Stephen G. Rhodes stages delirious situations that involve untimely incarnations of events and subjects. The spatial collision of both media and citation presents a theater of impossibility. Co-opting strategies of pedagogical entertainment found in theme parks, period cinema genre, and museological displays, Rhodes breaks down time machines, recovering residues of repressed strife and knowledge reanimated. For his first musuem solo exhibition, Rhodes debuts an installation revolving around the TV pioneer Steve Allen's late 1970s television chat show "Meeting of Minds"—a pre-Bill and Ted's anachronistic talk show featuring quests from different historical periods where one may find Frederick Douglass and the Marguis de Sade sharing laughs at a roundtable discussion with Niccolò Machiavelli and Elizabeth Barrett Browning. Organized by Ali Subotnick, Hammer curator.

Eric Baudelaire

July 9 - september 26, 2010

In his first U.S. museum solo show, Paris-based Eric Baudelaire will present his video *Sugar Water* (2007). The action takes place on a Paris metro platform where a bill poster covers a large advertising billboard with a sequence of images that depict a car parked on a Parisian street that bursts into flames, becomes swallowed up in smoke, and then remains only as a skeleton. Using a laborious traditional system to mount each image, this cinematic event gradually unfolds over the 72-minute film, offering a slow, contemplative consideration of political violence as a counterpoint to the rapid barrage of images we typically experience in our news media. Despite its slow, nearly meditative pace, Baudelaire's haunting and provocative work completely absorbs the viewer. Organized by Anne Ellegood, Hammer senior curator.

THE THREE MUSEUM (3M) PROJECT

DARIA MARTINMINOTAUR

continues through July 3, 2010

Daria Martin's 16mm film *Minotaur* pays tribute to the work of dance pioneer Anna Halprin, whose life and work has had a profound influence on Martin. This film is centered on a Halprin dance based on the sculpture *Minotaur* by Auguste Rodin from 1886 (also known as *Faun and Nymph*), a work possessing intensely erotic content (it depicts the part-man/part-bull figure from Greek mythology with a naked young female figure in its grasp). Martin's *Minotaur* extends her interweaving of highly conceptualized and choreographed physical movement; complexly layered stagecraft provoking unconventional formal relationships; direct allusions to modernist art history; and editing and cinematographic techniques evoking a broad range of the histories of both mainstream and experimental filmmaking.

Allison Agsten, curator of public engagement and director of visitor services at the Hammer, recently sat down with **Mark Allen**, director of Machine Project, to discuss his ongoing residency at the museum.

AA: For the uninitiated, explain what Machine Project does and also describe your role as its director.

MA: Machine Project is a nonprofit art and event space in Echo Park. It's also a loose group of artists, musicians, and performers who collaborate. We're very interested in thinking up new ways for people to interact with one another and with culture. We like projects that are friendly and intimate and that investigate a range of things humans like to do, such as making music, writing poetry, philosophizing, investigating scientific phenomena, eating cheese, etc. My role as director is to bring everyone together to develop ideas, think up new directions for projects, and be the hub that connects all the various spokes that make up Machine Project: people, ideas, and activities.

AA: Visually, your projects often don't align with the standard, super-slick museum look. How do you think that has impacted Hammer spaces?

MA: For the signage describing the projects that Machine is doing, we've used a very handmade, personalized aesthetic, involving a lot of letters cut out of different colors of construction paper. At the museum, we are in the interesting position of being a tiny institution inside the larger institution, trying to communicate to the visitors, so it's been important to establish a voice that is distinct from the official museum voice. I like projects that are informal and inviting, and the signage style works to reflect that aesthetic.

AA: Tell me about an upcoming project at the museum that you're really excited about.

MA: I've been working with musician and Machine sound curator Chris Kallmyer on a musical piece where admission to the museum will be free for a day in exchange for each visitor wearing a bell around their neck during their visit, effectively transforming everyone at the museum into part of a pervasive musical performance. Bells are great for this, they are impossible to play wrong (without some kind of extreme measure involving hammers).

AA: What can visitors expect to encounter on an average Saturday during your residency?

MA: Currently we're developing a lot of subtle and intimate musical performances. They may require some searching out but recent highlights include two minute concerts for a maximum of two people at a time in the cloakroom and a guitarist who you can check out to follow you around playing a sound track to the museum into headphones so only one person at a time can hear him. Also, we have a table tennis setup in Lindbrook Terrace for anyone who drops by, and that makes for a nice sound layer above the cafe.

Halprin's books include Movement Rituals, Moving toward Life: Five Decades of Transformational Dance, and Dance as a Healing Art.


