

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

This summer, we will open the remarkable retrospective Between Earth and Heaven: The Architecture of John Lautner on July 13. This exhibition is truly a labor of love, and after nearly eight years of planning, I am so pleased to be able to share with all of you the first museum survey of this visionary modernist architect's work.

Organized by the Hammer and jointly curated by Nicholas Olsberg, a cultural historian, and Frank Escher, an awardwinning architect, this exhibition will feature films, archival drawings, and large-scale and archival models to bring these iconic works to life in our galleries. As always, we are planning a lively series of related conversations, film screenings, walkthroughs, and a symposium. I'm also pleased to announce that the Hammer has partnered with the MAK Center to provide a variety of Lautner house tours so that Hammer members can experience the genius of his architecture themselves (for more details, see page 22).

There are many reasons to head to the Hammer this summer. The LA Film Festival will be held in venues throughout Westwood from June 19 to 29, including our own Billy Wilder Theater and the Hammer Courtyard. This is always a fantastic way to kick off our summer programming which includes Also I Like to Rock and JazzPOP, along with screenings and readings.







At the end of February, we said goodbye to James Bewley, Director of Public Programs, who is now in New York helping shape the artistic vision for the daring new cultural institution, the Park Avenue Armory. In March we welcomed Claudia Bestor to this position. Her eclectic background and knowledge of film, architecture and design, science, and popular culture, make her the perfect candidate to continue in the Hammer's tradition of presenting innovative, dynamic programs.

We are all proud of our own James Elaine who has just been awarded the 2008 Ordway Prize, receiving an unrestricted qift of \$100,000. This will help him in his new endeavors as Hammer adjunct curator based in China, where he is seeking out emerging artists there and throughout Asia, and further developing the Hammer's international outreach. Jamie's blog, now available on our website at www.hammer.ucla.edu, gives us all a fascinating insight into the art world in China. One of his initial discoveries, Sun Xun, will be here in residency this summer.

Finally, I am delighted to announce two new members of the Hammer Board of Directors, John Walsh and Helen Zell. As many of you know, John is Director Emeritus of the J. Paul Getty Museum and is an esteemed scholar, author and professor, most recently serving as adjunct professor at Yale University. Helen is the Vice President of the Zell Family Foundation and serves on a number of boards in Chicago, including the Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago. The entire staff and board join me in welcoming them to the Hammer.

BETWEEN EARTH AND HEAVEN THE ARCHITECTURE OF JOHN LAUTNER

Between Earth and Heaven: The Architecture of John Lautner is the first large-scale museum exhibition devoted to this innovative, yet underappreciated, American architect. Over the course of a career spent largely in Los Angeles, John Lautner (1911–1994) captured the essence of Southern California in more than 150 distinctive structures. Trained by Frank Lloyd Wright, Lautner is best known for such private homes as the Elrod Residence in Palm Springs, featured in the James Bond movie Diamonds Are Forever, and Los Angeles's iconic "Chemosphere."

With over 100 original drawings and models, spanning a 50-year period, this exhibition will present Lautner's central ideas on structure, siting, line, and space. Short films by award-winning documentarian Murray Grigor commissioned for this exhibition and a group of large, newly fabricated models will convey the sensation of fluidity and spatial movement experienced in Lautner's buildings.

Organized by the Hammer Museum, Between Earth and Heaven is curated jointly by Nicholas Olsberg, a cultural historian and expert on modern American architecture, and Frank Escher, an award-winning architect who helped establish The John Lautner Foundation. The exhibition will travel to The Lighthouse in Glasgow, the Wolfsonian in Miami, and the Palm Springs Art Museum.

Fritz Haeg works between his architecture and design practice, Fritz Haeg Studio, the happenings and gatherings of Sundown Salon, the ecology initiatives of Gardenlab, and his role as an educator. He has taught in architecture, design, and fine art programs at CalArts, Art Center College of Design, Parsons, and the University of Southern California. Haeg's new on-going series of projects called Animal Estates debuted at the Whitney Biennial in 2008. His first book, Edible Estates: Attack on the Front Lawn, will be followed in fall 2008 by Sundown Salon 2001–2006 In Words and Pictures. Chip Lord is a media artist who works with video and photography. As a member of Ant Farm, he produced video art classics Media Burn, The Eternal Frame and Cadillac Ranch in Amarillo, Texas. His video work straddles documentary and experimental genres, often mixing the two, and has been shown widely at film and video festivals and in museums. He is a Professor in the Film and Digital Media Department at UC Santa Cruz, and lives in San Francisco.

SHOOT ON SITE: ARCHITECTURE IN FILM

A SPECIAL FILM SERIES PRESENTED BY THE UCLA FILM & TELEVISION ARCHIVE

Whether describing Las Vegas or The Sistine Chapel, the phrase cinematic architecture speaks to the myriad ways that the movies have both inspired architects and altered our perception of built environments. The films in this series, however, find directors engaging with architecture on the architects' own turf, shooting on site. In the encounter between the director's and an architect's vision in these films, location shooting becomes a unique and fascinating process of adaptation and collaboration.

TOMMA ABTS

JULY 27 - NOVEMBER 9, 2008

Tomma Abts creates small, severe paintings that provide an intriguing antidote to the florid figuration that has dominated the contemporary painting discourse in the last decade. The exhibition, organized for the New Museum in New York by Laura Hoptman, Kraus Family Senior Curator, includes fourteen paintings, all of them the same size (18 7/8 x 15 inches), made over the past ten years. The exhibition at the Hammer Museum will also include a selection of pencil and color pencil drawings.


Abts won the Turner Prize in 2006 and this exhibition is the first individual presentation of the artist's work in a US museum. Abts's commitment to abstraction is absolute. Her paintings are non-representational and free from all reference to nature or to the world at large. In their stab at profundity, the paintings are also intensely moving and

relevant to our uncertain times. The exhibition is accompanied by an illustrated catalogue that will include more than 50 reproductions of the artist's paintings and drawings, as well as feature essays by critics Jan Verwoert and Bruce Hainley and curator Laura Hoptman.

Born in Kiel, Germany in 1967, Abts lives and works in London. She has had solo exhibitions at Kunsthalle Basel, Switzerland; Douglas Hyde Gallery, Dublin; and Van Abbemuseum, Eindhoven (with Vincent Fecteau); and has been included in major international exhibitions, including the 54th Carnegie International; the 4th Berlin Biennale; and the 2006 Shanghai Biennale.

HENRY COOMBES

JUNE 12 - SEPTEMBER 7, 2008 Scottish artist Henry Coombes explores the tension between instinctual. natural impulses and the constraints of polite society. He presents viewers with seemingly idyllic scenarios that gradually delve into the deeper, darker inclinations of human nature. In two of his recent films—Laddy and the Lady (2005) and *Gralloch* (2007)—actors don animal costumes and the traditional sportsman attire of the British elite, playing out scenes at once amusing, disturbing and surreal. Both films will be on view in the Hammer's Video Gallery, marking Coombes's first exhibition in an American museum.

MUNGO THOMSON

LATE JUNE - DECEMBER 4, 2008 Los Angeles-based artist Mungo Thomson's works ponder notions of mysticism and the big questions in life with an underlying deadpan wit. For the Hammer's Lobby Wall, Thomson presents a variation of his *Negative Space* project, which as he puts it, "came out of reflecting on the color of nothing; in outer space the void is black, and in the art context the void, the empty gallery, is always white." Thomson found an online image archive of starscape photos taken by the Hubble Space Telescope and has downloaded the copyright-free images and inverted them with a simple Photoshop tool. The result is a spectacular starburst that looks more like a close-up of minerals or marble than space debris. For the Lobby Wall, Thomson has chosen the M74 and NGC 3370 galaxies.



SUN XUN

JULY 11 - OCTOBER 12, 2008 Sun Xun, a Chinese artist born in 1980 and living in Hangzhou, creates animations that combine hand-drawn renderings and traditional materials with new media. He studied printmaking at the China Academy of Fine Arts, but a burgeoning interest in moving images led him to establish his own animation studio in 2006. Sun Xun produces a multitude of drawings that incorporate text within the image. His subjects range from elements found in world history and politics to natural organisms, filming these drawings in sequence to create a sense of movement and suggest the passage of time. For over a week, Sun Xun will take over the Vault Gallery to develop a new animated, site-related video and drawing installation.

The Hammer introduces *Housequest*, an occasional series in which we invite an artist to curate an exhibition from our holdings. For the first of this series, Los Angeles-based artist Jennifer Bornstein visited the Grunwald Center for the Graphic Arts over a period of six months. She browsed through a historical landscape of works on paper, and selected prints, drawings, and photographs by artists as diverse as Rembrandt van Rijn and Man Ray.

This exhibition examines the development of serial imagery in prints, first inspired by the printed book in the late fifteenth century, and explored in contemporary printed series. Drawn primarily from the extensive collection of works on paper in the Grunwald Center for the Graphic Arts, the exhibition is one of an ongoing series focusing on the Hammer's permanent collections. Includes works by Albrecht Dürer, Jacques Callot, Francisco Goya, and Giovanni Battista Piranesi, through Christiane Baumgartner, Chris Burden, Mona Hatoum, and Chris Ofili.

This exhibition is organized by Cynthia Burlingham, Director of the Grunwald Center and Deputy Director of Collections at the Hammer Museum.

An ambitious new sculpture by Los Angeles artist Nathan Mabry was recently jointly acquired by the Hammer Museum and the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego (MCASD). Entitled Process Art (Dead Men Don't Make Sculpture), it will be exhibited first at MCASD from May 2008 to May 2009 and then shown at the Hammer Museum in the summer of 2009.

Mabry's work was first presented at the Hammer Museum in the exhibition Thing: New Sculpture from Los Angeles in 2005. This new sculpture joins ten other works by the artist already in the Hammer Contemporary Collection, including six photographs, three drawings, and another major sculpture given

by Dean Valentine and Amy Adelson. The purchase of this work for the Hammer was made possible, in part, by Murray Gribin, a member of our Board of Overseers.

Mabry's work often fuses references to classic modern art and the art of tribal and ancient civilizations of the Americas. In this sculpture, Mabry purchased an unauthorized cast of Rodin's sculpture The Thinker through the Internet and removed its patina, then repatinated it and overlaid the sculpture with a bronze cast of an altered latex mask. Large in scale, the sculpture is both unsettling and humorous, irreverent and yet carefully wrought and conceptually complex.

Consisting of former members of the band Irving, and filling out the sound with several new members including horns and an operatic female vocal backing, Afternoons create an enormous textured landscape upon which to float their well-written songs.

JAZZPOP

THE CRIME OF PUNISHMENT MARC MAUER, JAMES GREY & NORM STAMPER **TUESDAY, JUNE 10, 7PM**

With less than five percent of the world's population, the US holds a quarter of the world's prisoners. The root of this is the high rate of incarceration for drug offenses, and their lengthy sentences. With a declared cost of \$70 billion a year and a hidden cost of up to \$200 billion, the "War on Drugs" is now the gateway to the prison/industrial complex. Marc Mauer is one of the country's leading experts on sentencing policy, race, and the criminal justice system, and is the author of Young Black Men and the Criminal Justice System, and Americans Behind Bars. Gray, Superior Court of Santa Ana, and Chief Norm Stamper, retired Seattle Police Chief, are both part of Law Enforcement Against Prohibition (LEAP), and will provide an alternative look at this failed policy.



PAYING FOR PLAY MONEY MICHAEL GREENBERGER

As the recession becomes more apparent and a depression more possible, Professor Michael Greenberger, former Director of Trading and Markets at the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, explains the crisis in American capitalism where finance has replaced production as income disparity grows and debt piles up. Until recently, the US has been considered the world's most successful industrial democracy because its currency and its credit set the world's standard. Lack of individual security, insufficient private and public investment, slow growth, an antiquated tax system, and widening disparities in income fortell a potential global financial crisis of catastrophic proportions. This could occur if the US dollar ceased to be the world's reserve currency, exposing the full extent of our debt.



She has shown and taught in Mexico, Australia, England, Scandinavia, the Caribbean, and the United States—including at UCLA.

But rather than dying out, b-boying went underground and global, and has now evolved into an extraordinary dance form with a remarkably interconnected worldwide culture. *Inside the Circle*, an award-winning documentary by Marcy Garriott, provides a unique window into this world as it follows the intense and intertwined stories of three Texas b-boys—Romeo Navarro (B-Boy City), Josh (MIND-180), and Omar (Mighty Zulu Kingz)—across several years. A reception and Q & A with the filmmaker and featured dancers follows the screening.

SLEEPLESS

Contemporary ballet choreographer Jiri Kylián created Sleepless in 2005 featuring six dancers from the Netherlands Dance Theatre (NDT). Sleepless presents a hallucinating blend of body parts that unexpectedly appear and disappear through a permeable back wall. Composer Dirk Haubrich uses the glass harmonica and the slow passages of Mozart's Adagio and Rondo in C Minor to add a mysterious fragility. Kylián has created 72 ballets for NDT, and made original works for the Stuttgart Ballet, Paris Opéra, Swedish Television, and the Tokyo Ballet, and has received numerous international awards. His creations are danced by more than 80 companies and schools worldwide.

BODY REMIX

If director Stanley Kubrick made ballets this is what they would look like! Choreographer Marie Chouinard from Montreal and her company of ten dancers execute variations on the exercise of freedom in this stage production from 2005 filmed in 2007. Chouinard integrates crutches, rope, prostheses, horizontal bars, and harnesses into her outrageously creative choreography. Manipulations of Glenn Gould's recording of the Goldberg Variations by Bach adds to this aberrant ballet that looks at the age-old story of the "Beauty and the Beast". Chunky Move, a contemporary dance company in Australia founded by Artistic Director Gideon Obarzanek in 1995, has earned an enviable reputation for producing a distinct yet unpredictable brand of genre-defying dance performance. In this film from 2006, six women imitate their dads' dancing in a film about fathers as seen through the eyes of their daughters. These unseen men come to life through the dances and reflections of their children.

BEST DOCUMENTARY SHORT FILM MELBOURNE INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL

HERE AFTER

At the crossroads of fiction and dance, this film is an adaptation of Puur (2005), by Belgian choreographer Wim Vandekeybus and his company Ultima Vez. It combines excerpts from the Super 8 short film that accompanied the performance with 16mm images from the studio and on location at Oye-Plage. Through flashbacks, Here After tells the story of an isolated community in which a power-mad tyrant commands an infanticide. In the danced sequences we see how the victims relive their memories in the hereafter. as though their emotions and traumas had permeated their bodies. Vandekeybus and Ultima Vez have won acclaim for performances that are a challenging combination of intensely physical, often confrontational choreography and film or video. Here After recently won the 'Creativity Award' from the National Film Board of Canada at the FIFA (Festival International du Film sur l'Art) in Montreal.






