

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# A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Fifteen years ago this month, I moved to Los Angeles and took over leadership of the Hammer Museum. At the time, the museum was solely focused on presenting the Armand Hammer Collection and traveling exhibitions in its galleries with few, if any programs. The Hammer—and Los Angeles—has changed remarkably since then, beyond what I could have ever imagined. In the last year alone, we've embarked upon several new initiatives—most importantly, the museum is now FREE for all visitors thanks to the extraordinary generosity of Erika J. Glazer and Brenda R. Potter.

The energy and momentum generated this year were also felt at our recent Gala in the Garden honoring Mark Bradford and Joni Mitchell. We were joined by some of L.A.'s most inspiring artists and citizens, and we raised a record-setting \$2.5 million to support our programming and exhibitions.

Among our growing network of friends and supporters, we are thrilled to announce the newest member of our Board of Overseers, Richard Buckley, a collector and longstanding supporter of the museum. A former fashion editor at Women's Wear Daily and editor-in-chief of Voque Hommes International, Richard has co-chaired the Hammer Circle since its inception and will continue to be a fantastic ambassador for the museum.

Looking ahead, the Hammer is preparing for another year of groundbreaking firsts. In early 2015 we will take our renowned Public Engagement program outside

our four walls and begin a partnership with Art + Practice (A+P). Conceived and founded by the artist Mark Bradford with Eileen Harris Norton and Allan DiCastro, A+P is a new non-profit organization in Leimert Park that will work with foster youth to build practical skills while also stressing the importance of art and creative activity. A major grant from the James Irvine Foundation will support our collaboration and enable us to present exhibitions and programs at A+P. The first exhibition will feature new work by the Los Angeles artist Charles Gaines and will coincide with an exhibition of his earlier work here at the Hammer. We are excited by the possibilities that will unfold around this endeavor and hope you will celebrate with us when A+P opens in February.

In this new year we will continue to stage the work of unknown, world-renowned, and cross-disciplinary artists from across the globe—hailing from Great Britain to Afghanistan and of course Los Angeles. We will also be initiating a yearlong public program series focused on water as well as a yearlong series on Armenian culture on the occasion of the 100-year anniversary of the Armenian genocide. It promises to be another phenomenal year

at the Hammer and I look forward to seeing you around the museum often.

# **ROBERT HEINECKEN:**OBJECT MATTER

**CONTINUES THROUGH JANUARY 18, 2015** 

Robert Heinecken (1931–2006) was a pioneer in the postwar Los Angeles art scene, describing himself as a "para-photographer" because his work stood "beside" or "beyond" traditional ideas associated with photography. Culling images from periodicals, pornography, and television, he recontextualized them through collage and assemblage, double-sided photograms, darkroom experimentation, and rephotography. Although Heinecken was rarely behind the lens of a camera, his photo-based works question the nature of photography and radically redefine the perception of it as an artistic medium. His works explore themes of commercialism, Americana, kitsch, sex, the body, and gender. This survey exhibition, organized by the Museum of Modern Art, New York, covers the artist's unique practice from the early 1960s through the late 1990s.



# **CHARLES GAINES:** GRIDWORK 1974–1989

# FEBRUARY 7 - MAY 24, 2015

Highly regarded as both a leading practitioner of conceptualism and an influential educator at the California Institute of the Arts, the Los Angeles-based Charles Gaines is celebrated for his photographs, drawings, and works on paper that investigate how rules-based procedures construct order and meaning. Working serially in progressive and densely layered bodies of work, Gaines explores the interplay between objectivity and interpretation, the systematic and the poetic. His groundbreaking work of this period serves as a critical bridge between the first-generation conceptualists of the 1960s and 1970s and those artists of later generations exploring the limits of subjectivity and language. *Gridwork 1974–1989* is the first museum survey of the early years of a career that now spans four decades and features more than 80 works from eleven different series, including rare and never-before-seen pieces, some of which were presumed lost.

# **CHARLES GAINES:** LIBRETTOS: MANUEL DE FALLA / STOKELY CARMICHAEL

FEBRUARY 28 - MAY 31, 2015

In collaboration with *Charles Gaines: Gridwork 1974–1989* at the Hammer Museum, Art + Practice presents Charles Gaines's Librettos: Manuel de Falla / Stokely Carmichael at its space in Leimert Park. Employing a systems-based conceptualism that Gaines has long embraced and highlighting the enduring influence of composer John Cage's experiments with chance, the new 12-part body of work brings together the score of a tragic love story, the 1911 opera La Vida Breve by Spanish composer Manuel de Falla, and a fiery 1964 speech by the civil rights activist and Black Panther Party member Stokely Carmichael. The unexpected combination of music and text foregrounds the universality of long-standing class and racial struggles and the power of music to bridge difference.

The technique known as frottage, from the French frotter (to rub), involves the rendering of an image by placing a sheet of paper over an object or dimensional surface and rubbing it with a marking agent such as graphite or wax crayon. It combines elements of drawing, printmaking, and sculpture, and generates sophisticated and unexpected compositions that capture the more elusive properties of objects. As a partially indirect process intended for unpremeditated imagery, frottage became one of the fundamental practices of surrealist drawing. It continued to be explored throughout the twentieth century and remains a source of experimentation in studios today. This exhibition presents diverse interpretations of the technique by artists from various periods and regions, from historical figures like the Czech surrealists Jindřich Štýrský and Toyen to modern and contemporary artists such as Alighiero Boetti, Louise Bourgeois, Roy Lichtenstein, Michelle Stuart, and Matt Mullican. Also on view are rare examples of 19thcentury rubbings of British funerary plaques that belong to a long tradition of recording reliefs for posterity.

Shadows and ethereal forms are lifted onto the paper like apparitions in this eclectic yet singularly focused selection of works.

Frottage is nothing other than a technical means of intensifying the hallucinatory faculties of the spirit in such a way that 'visions' automatically appear, a means of ridding oneself of one's blindness.—Max Ernst

British designer Thomas Heatherwick has been hailed as a genius for the uniquely inventive nature of his work. Trained at London's Royal College of Art, Heatherwick's practice encompasses projects ranging in scale from small to monumental, from products to public sculpture to architecture.

This exhibition, organized by the Nasher Sculpture Center, Dallas, and quest curated by Brooke Hodge, is the first in North America to present the work of Heatherwick and his studio. *Provocations: The Architecture and Design* of Heatherwick Studio examines the range of the studio's practice by focusing on the design concepts behind products such as the handbag designed for Longchamp and his rotation-molded "Spun" chairs, as well as public and private architectural projects in the U.K., U.S., Abu Dhabi, South Africa, Singapore, and China. These include the U.K. Pavilion, the Seed Cathedral, at the 2010 World Expo; a new distillery for Bombay Sapphire gin; a Learning Hub for Nanyang Technological University; and a contemporary art museum created within a historic grain silo, among

many other projects. Heatherwick Studio is recognized for its inventive approach to design, often combining novel engineering, new materials, and innovative technology to create unusual building forms.

Hammer Projects presents recent videos by three international artists. The works by Ed Atkins (British, b. 1982), Loretta Fahrenholz (German, b. 1981), and Tommy Hartung (American, b. 1979) explore such themes as trauma, melancholy, surrealism, and the uncanny. Atkins's Even Pricks (2013) consists of a series of hyper-polished vignettes that relate the idea of depression—both physical and psychological—to the immaterial surfaces of images. Fahrenholz's Ditch Plains (2013) depicts New York after Hurricane Sandy as a site wracked by environmental devastation, economic collapse, and racial tension. Hartung's epic new video, THE BIBLE (2014), incorporates found footage, fictitious news footage, and animation in a dramatic exploration of issues from the Old Testament including morality, ethics, religion, and war.

# MARIA HASSABI

**GALLERY 6 | JANUARY 31 - MARCH 1, 2015** 

The work of the director, choreographer, and dancer Maria Hassabi is rooted in the discourses of contemporary sculpture and theater. Through durational choreographies that confound the perception of time and the act of viewing, her works reflect on the conventions of display and the strategies of staging. Performed by Hassabi alongside Hristoula Harakas, Molly Lieber, and Oisin Monaghan, this new work extends Hassabi's interest in the relationship between stillness and the physical body, evades the notion of the group performer as a "mutated machine," and seeks to develop a new way of processing and experiencing solo performance over time and throughout space. Unfolding daily throughout the museum's hours of operation, and occupying the gallery as well other ancillary spaces in the Hammer's courtyard and lobby, the performance will adhere to the constraints of exhibition time.

# **PEDRO REYES**

VAULT GALLERY | JANUARY 31 - MAY 24, 2015

The Mexican artist Pedro Reyes's project *The People's United Nations* (*pUN*) is both an exhibition and an event that puts the diplomatic and global problem-solving goals of the United Nations in the hands of ordinary people. The exhibition includes a group of sculptures and several paintings on Tyvek that graphically portray political, social, and environmental issues faced by our world today. The *pUN* delegate event (May 2–3, 2015) is an experimental gathering of volunteers selected to represent as many of the 195 member and observer states of the United Nations as possible. The *pUN* enlists regular citizens who live in the Los Angeles area and are connected by family ties or by birth to the nations represented at the UN. Participants will engage in activities that test Reyes's hypothesis that conflict-resolution techniques used in social psychology, theater, and art can help solve the world's most challenging problems, including climate change, fair wages for women, and food shortages.

The pUN delegate convening is organized in collaboration with Allison Agsten, curator, Public Engagement, with January Parkos Arnall, curatorial assistant, Public Engagement. First conceived and presented at the Queens Museum in 2013, whose building was the site of the United Nations from 1946–1950.

# LILY VAN DER STOKKER

LOBBY WALL | FEBRUARY 7 - MAY 17, 2015

The Dutch artist Lily van der Stokker has been making bold, colorful large-scale wall paintings for more than 20 years. The artist applies colors ranging from soft pastels to bright fluorescents—sometimes in playful and visually arresting plaid patterns or allover flower motifs—to amorphous soft-edged forms that inhabit the space like friendly oversized visitors. Witty texts added alongside her forms complicate their first impression as the cartoony doodles of an adolescent or mere decorative ornamentation. Invoking the platitudes of polite society with expressions like "Best regards" or "Wonderful" or touching on the realities that impact all our lives, from love to money to aging, with phrases like "Transfer the money to me" or "Only yelling older women in here, nothing to sell," van der Stokker makes evident the power dynamics at work within seemingly innocuous spaces. She argues for the role of pleasure in aesthetic experience, finding alliances between beauty and intellect, playfulness, and criticality.



# LISA BLOOM & CARL E. DOUGLAS

Ai-jen Poo, director of the National Domestic Workers Alliance, is the winner of a 2014 MacArthur Fellowship and was named one of Time magazine's 100 Most Influential People in the World for her groundbreaking advocacy on behalf of domestic workers and home care workers. She is also the co-director of Caring Across Generations. Her new book is The Age of Dignity: Preparing for the Elder Boom in a Changing America. The son of migrant farm workers, Fernando Torres-Gil is the director of the UCLA Center for Policy Research on Aging and a professor of Social Welfare and Public Policy. His research spans important topics of health and long-term care, disability, entitlement reform, and the politics of aging. He has written several books including The New Aging: Politics and Change in America.


